Please Post Only (1) Sign

As we all prepare for the upcoming elections it will most likely lead you to posting signs for those who you wish to support. Whether it be local Amendments, candidates or issues along with national candidates, the neighborhood has always had a covenant detailing the posting of signs. The covenants are tied to your property deed that you signed when you purchased your home. The covenants are conveyed to any property being rented through the contracts signed before moving in. The covenants are continually enforced through the efforts of the Covenant Control Group and they are also legally enforced through the Jefferson County Courts.

Covenant C-7 Signs

(Covenant B-9 for those in the Columbine West Hillside Addition):

"No sign of any kind shall be displayed to the public view on any lot except one professional sign of not more than one square foot, one sign of not more than five square feet advertising the property for sale or rent, or signs used by a builder to advertise the property during the construction and sales period." Can we please be respectful of our neighbors and take the time to make (1) critical decision as to which (1) sign you will display on your property, which also includes your garage door, mailbox or front window. Our neighborhood is showing great pride these days with homeowners remodeling inside and front yards becoming welcoming entrances. When we drive through and walk around, it is so comforting to see "pride of ownership". Thank you Columbine West for your continued efforts.

Volcanoes on Mars? Maybe

The Curiosity rover has made an unexpected discovery on Mars that's making scientists re-examine what they know about the history of the red planet.

As reported on the ScienceDaily website, Curiosity drilled into a rock at a location on the Martian landscape known as "Buckskin," collecting powder that was analyzed by X-ray diffraction. Scientists identified the powder as tridymite, a silicate mineral.

What's surprising? Tridymite is associated with volcanism—which wasn't thought to be a feature of Mars. The discovery has scientists wondering whether active volcanoes were at one time present on Mars despite its lower temperature. Mars, it seems, is still full of surprises.

Sea Sponge Could Hold Key to Fighting Deadly Infections

MRSA (methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus) is a bacterial infection that kills an average of 11,000 patients every year in the United States. But scientists now believe they've discovered an Antarctic sea sponge that produces a chemical compound capable of stopping it.

According to the UPI website, researchers studying the defense mechanisms of sea sponges—as well as algae and underwater invertebrate organisms—found the compound, named darwinolide, in Dendrilla membranosa. It works by penetrating MRSA's protective biofilm, a coating of proteins, carbohydrates, and DNA that current antibiotics can't get through.

Harvesting the sponges from the sea floor is neither practical nor environmentally sound, so the scientists are looking for a way to produce the compound synthetically. Fortunately, UPI states, most chemical compounds found in nature can be reproduced in the lab by chemists.

Get Your Imagination Going When You Paint

You don't have to be a Picasso to find satisfaction and enjoyment in creating art. When you're searching for ideas or subjects to paint, consider these approaches:

- Seek inspiration. Spend some looking at art paintings, sculpture, drawings. Listen to music to stimulate your creative juices.
- Start small. If you're hesitant, or blocked, don't tackle a big art project. Start with something small and easy. 




What Your \$25 CWCA Membership Goes Towards

When a resident pays twenty five dollars to become a CWCA member for the year just how is that money spent? We here on the CWCA board have been asked that question a few times so I thought it was time to share that information. The chart below shows spending breakdown by category by membership dollar amount. The five categories roughly reflect our mission statement, also shown above, to beautify the neighborhood, provide community based services, and social activities. Also included are CWCA operating expenses. Being an all volunteer organization helps keep our operating expenses low so your membership fee is better used for things that you care about as opposed to paying for professional management services. Let me go into some detail on each category. Landscape maintenance is for purchasing supplies for entrances. This can be mulch, plants, paint, weed/bug spraying, watering and the like. It does not reflect labor for those activities; that is solicited from the residents when we have cleanup days. Community projects/Beautification mainly covers covenant control but can also cover larger projects. We live in a beautiful subdivision and keeping it that way takes significant effort by a small cadre of dedicated volunteers known as the Covenant Control Group. Formerly know as the Architectural Control Committee, or ACC, this group has recently been split from the ACC to provide better task focus. The ACC will now focus on handling building requests and modifications and ACC members will be the standing board. Covenant control is costly due to letter postage, specialized tracking tools, and court fees. Social Committee provides for neighborhood events like Dumpster Day, contests, and open pool days. Dumpster Day is by far one of the most expensive activities and also one of the best attended. Membership committee expenses are centered around the yearly membership drive and welcome bags for new residents. General operating expenses make up the balance, going towards insurance, building use fees, and general supplies. With slightly less than 400 members out of almost 1500 residents the CWCA has limited budget to perform our mission. Of the 400 registered annual members there are 4 Officers, 6 Board members and a few active Committee Chairs. All of the volunteers have times when they are out of town or away on business, which then leaves their duties unattended. Each one of our volunteers are dedicated to their specific job and not necessarily trained on another to be able to fill in the gaps. Our largest team of 30 volunteers are those who deliver the newsletters to your door each month. Many of our volunteers have jobs so their available time to perform CWCA duties are limited. As president I have a vision for the future and that vision is to increase membership so we can provide more social activities but also to double our volunteer base. I have heard many great suggestions from residents for new activities such as block parties and an annual easter egg hunt but without the budget, and especially the volunteer base, we just can't grow to our potential. If you are not currently a CWCA member please consider joining us. If you are a member we would love to hear your ideas for new social activities and we would love even more to get you involved as a volunteer. Call us or email us, our contact information is listed in this newsletter.

Keep Your Kids, And Yourself, Safe This Halloween

Halloween is one of the most popular holidays of the year. Who doesn't love dressing up and getting candy and other treats? You and your family have to be cautious, though. Follow these tips for a happy and safe Halloween:

CHILDREN

- Bring a flashlight.
- · Walk, don't run.
- Use sidewalks; if no sidewalk is available, walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic.
- · Don't cut across yards or driveways.
- Obey traffic signals.
- Don't go into unfamiliar neighborhoods; approach only houses that are lit.
- Bring a watch you can read in the dark.
- Avoid tripping by wearing costumes that don't drag and shoes that fit.
- Don't wear masks that interfere with your vision.
- Don't carry nonflexible knives, swords or other dangerous props.
- Wear reflective markings or tape on costumes so motorists can see you.
- Avoid unfamiliar pets.
- Carry a cellphone to call home in an emergency.

PARENTS

- Provide healthy alternatives to candy, like fruit rolls, miniboxes of raisins, or popcorn.
- Consider offering nonfood treats like pencils, stickers, coins, or erasers.



Heart Health Improving for Americans

Americans are taking better care of their hearts, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. According to a study published in the American Journal of Preventive Medicine, the rate of heart disease in Americans over 40 dropped to 8 percent in 2011-12, down from 10 percent in 2001-02. Among Americans 60 and older, the rate dropped from 19.5 percent to 15 percent in the same time frames. The researchers found no significant change either way in Americans 40-59 years old, however.

One factor influencing the improvement was having access to health insurance, according to the study. Better management of risk factors like high blood pressure, cholesterol, smoking, weight, and diabetes probably contributed to the decline, the report suggested.
