



#### WHAT IS THE 6 SECOND BREAK IN?

Everyone who's home includes an enclosed garage should know AND PRE-VENT this scenario coined "the 6 second break-in". It's called that because



that is how long it takes for an experienced burglar to open your garage door without a remote. What's most alarming (no pun intended) is that this particular method carries a twofold disguise that is very much worth knowing. Not only is it very easy to perform and not very recognizable as a burglary, it allows access into your home because most residents do not lock their inner door. Not that this is much of a deterrent because once inside, the burglar (or in most cases burglars) have complete privacy to your home once they close the garage door. With this type of access it doesn't really make a difference if the inner door is locked or not, because they can use tools and defeat most any lock without the neighbors seeing or hearing. Then the second most dangerous fact to this break-in is that if your vehicle is in the garage, they can load it up and drive it out without raising the neighbor's suspicion. Keep in mind that should you remove the lanyard or "zip tie" the little lever, you defeat the purpose of the lock release should you need to exit during a fire, or power outage. For about \$25.00, the internet or local hardware store has items you can order that provide a shield against releasing the little lever with a coat hanger or similar device from outside the home.

#### **Metrocenter continued:**

Our vision is to create a mixed-use palate that makes the very best use of this site – both its existing space and parts of the property that can support redevelopment or new development "such as senior housing, multifamily housing, corporate office, healthcare and additional retail, restaurant and entertainment amenities," said Fink.

The PUD also allows for a height increase up to 180 feet (approximately 15 stories) and allows Carlyle to almost double its current 800,000 square feet of existing space, to a total 1.6 million square feet. This rezoning encompasses 130 acres, with 83 acres of that occupied by Metrocenter Mall, the adjoining Macys and Sears anchor spaces, and the 10-acre land site of a future Walmart Supercenter. The balance of the PUD – approximately 45 acres – encompasses land and businesses around the mall loop road, including Castles-N-Coasters, College of America and the former Sports Authority big box.

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
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
