Help to Keep Sidewalks Clear of Snow & Ice

A fresh blanket of snow is a pretty sight. Maybe for a few minutes. Or in a photograph. Or if you are a kid and you're getting a snow-day. But if you're a homeowner, removing this blanket is no cozy chore. Here are several tips for safe shoveling: Use a smaller shovel, make sure your shovel isn't bent, tilting or otherwise damaged, take frequent breaks even if only for a couple of minutes, stop and go inside if you become overheated, drink fluids, don't try to fling snow long distances and especially stop any time you feel pain.

Removing the snow is just the first step in the process of making your driveways and walkways snow and ice-free. Dealing with the ice left behind is the next challenge. Ice does not just freeze on the pavement, it freezes to the pavement. Breaking that bond, or keeping it from forming in the first place, is the task of chemical de-icers. A de-icer is a chemical agent that is spread on snow or ice. It does not melt all the snow; it seeps through to the surface of the pavement and melts the ice there, breaking the bond and making it easier to remove the snow. If you fear you're unable to tackle this tiring task, look into spending a few bucks and having a neighborhood kid shovel after a storm, it's probably money well spent. Those homeowners who have a North facing front yard/ driveway, which inevitabley has it's problems with snow melting off during the day, please pay attention to removing the snow before temperatures drop in the evening.

With everyone taking care of their own piece, the neighborhood sidewalks will be clear and safe for everyone to travel. Take a moment to watch out for your neighbors when the weather gets nasty. Help them shovel. If you havn't seen a neighbor out and about you can always request a "good will" check from the Sheriff's Dept.

Covenant Corner

Columbine West Civic Association (CWCA) provides several services to our neighborhood, one service being covenant control. Our CWCA Covenant Control Group (CCG) handles hundreds of violations each year. Two habitual offenders who felt the covenants did not apply and were repeat offenders were especially problematic last year. After following the standard course of notification and receiving no corrective action by the homeowners, the CCG was obligated by our Standard Operating Procedure to take these residents to court. Jefferson County Courts determined that both residents were in violation of our covenants, given court orders to correct their violations, and pay court costs with assessed fines. One court case was appealed on the basis that CWCA has no authority to enforce covenants. The appeal was recently overturned as the court determined that CWCA does in fact have the right to engage in covenant enforcement. The resident was required to pay additional legal costs and fines.

Our covenants were put in place by the developer to protect and ensure our community remains a first class residential development. A cleaner, less cluttered neighborhood invites less crime, improves neighbor relations and upholds property value. This benefits us all. Conversely, we tend to see negative impacts when residents selfishly ignore covenants and subsequently frustrate their neighbors. This not only creates hard feelings but leads other neighbors to follow their bad example. CWCA wants residents to know we are sensitive to grievances and will actively participate towards resolution whether it be though reminder letters or, in extreme cases, legal action. Our goal is to have residents correct violations in a timely manner, not punish violators with court. So please help us by observing our covenants and, if you receive a letter, correcting a violation. This is all we ask.

Marcia's Gardening Tips - Xeriscaping

We welcome any and all article submissions. In the upcoming months we will highlight some quality information about gardening and home land-scape. We hope you gain some insight and see the fruition of your hard work.

Xeriscaping is probably one of the topics that I am asked most about. First of all, the name confuses many. It is Xeriscaping NOT Zeroscaping. I do get that some purposefully mispronounce the term because they believe it refers to just rock. This is by no means true. A xeric garden can be lush and colorful! In addition to the name thing, others think xeriscaping refers to a type of plant. Again, that is also not true. Plants can be xeric but the term xeriscaping encompasses so much more:

- Xeriscaping refers to landscaping and gardening in ways that reduce
 or eliminate the need for supplemental water from irrigation. The
 word xeriscaping is a portmanteau of xeros (Greek for "dry")
 and landscaping, and xeriscape is used for this style of garden.
 Xeriscaping refers to a method of landscape design that minimizes
 water use.
- In some areas, terms such as water-conserving landscapes, drought-tolerant landscaping, zeroscaping, and smart scaping are used instead. Plants whose natural requirements are appropriate to the local climate are emphasized, and care is taken to avoid losing water to evaporation and run-off. The specific plants used in xeri-scaping depend upon the climate.
- While many Denver Water employees helped coin the term xeriscape, Xeriscape and the xeriscape logo are not registered trademarks of Denver Water, the water department of Denver, Colorado. They were created by the Front Range Xeriscape Task Force of

Denver Department in 1978.

THE SEVEN PRINCIPLES OF XERISCAPE

Principle 1 – Planning and Design

- Select the right plants
- Place in the right spot
- · Group by water need
- Space properly to avoid excessive water use
- View, exposure, slope
- Direct drainage to landscaping
- · Irrigation system choices
- Preservation of natural areas, buffers, wetlands

Principle 2 – Soil Improvement

- Test soils to identify needed improvements (e.g., texture, nutrients, salts, pH)
- Proper soil preparation is critical to landscapes
- 3-5 c.y. organic matter per 1000 sp. Ft., tilled 4-6 inches
- Preserve topsoil for reuse.

Principle 3 – Hydrozoning

- Group plants with like water needs
- Place log-water ground covers in difficult maintenance area (steep slopes, narrow strips)
- Place low-water plants at top of slopes

Principle 4 – Practical Turf Areas

- Valuable purposes of turf:
- Provides recreational benefit, good for high-use areas (e.g. bluegrass).
- · Reduces wind and water erosion.
- Provides cooling effect.
- Filters and infiltrates runoff.
- Aesthetics.
- Consider alternatives for narrow s\trips, hard-to-water and hardto-maintain areas (steep slopes).

Principle 5 – Efficient Irrigation

- Assure the overall quality of the system.
- Design the system for the efficient and uniform distribution of water.
- Install the system to meet design criteria
- Maintain the system for optimum performance
- Manage the irrigation system to respond to the changing need for water.

Principle 6 – Mulching

- · Reduces water loss
- Reduces soil loss
- Suppresses weeds
- Promotes uniform temperature

- Promotes soil micro-organism activity
 - Aesthetic amenity

Principle 7 Appropriate Maintenance

- Check, adjust and repair irrigation system
 - Reset irrigation controller
 - Aerate turf
 - Replenish mulch
 - Apply fertilizer, as needed
 - Properly prune
 - Pesticide/herbicide as needed
 - Maintain Equipment
 - Monitor and keep records

I know this all sounds like a lot. Really, most of it is common sense. Pick plants that fit the climate, feed them, water them, put them in the right area, cover them, provide good nutrition, introduce them to good friends (plants with similar needs) and always think and plan before you act. It sounds like being a parent. Actually, it is so much easier than that!

Spring is right around the corner. Now is a great time to start with Principle 1 – Planning and Design. Enjoy!!!

All friends of the Columbine Kiwanis are invited to join us for this casual come-and-go gathering during happy hour.



We have seen an increase in the use of counterfeit bills over recent months. In November and December we've had 30 reports of fraud involving counterfeit money, compared to 4 cases reported for the same time frame in 2015.

Not only are local businesses impacted by fraudulent money, but you can be as well if you've been given a counterfeit bill and do not realize it. This can happen when you sell items to strangers through sites like Craigslist, or even at garage sales. These photos can help you identify a counterfeit bill when you receive one, or before you use one inadvertently.

Fake money can come in any denomination, but is easily identified when you hold it up to light and do not see a watermark and a security strip. When looking at the front of the bill while holding it up to the light, the watermark will be visible on the right side of the bill. The security thread is a vertical strip that includes the denomination of the bill; however, this will not be present on \$1.00 and \$2.00 bills. Neither the watermark nor the security strip can be seen clearly without light filtering through the bill. If you have a bill that does not have these features, please report it to local law enforcement.

Unfortunately we will not be able to replace the fraudulent bill with real currency, but you may be able to help us identify the source of the fake money.
