

It's been several years since I mentioned wanting to have a monthly garden section. I guess it's never too late to begin. As I mentioned in the past, I do not profess to be a Master Gardener, but I do have some experience with plants and enjoy working in the yard. Recently someone asked for information regarding sod-

ding and which sod does best in this area. There are many different grasses used for yards, such as Bermuda, Zoysia, St. Augustine, and even buffalo grass, and so I suggest you do some research to determine which one is best for your own yard. For me, the best allaround grass for yards is the evergreen St. Augustine grass. The various types all



go dormant but not completely brown in winter and offer a lush green, thick lawn in the growing season. There are two types of St. Augustine grass which I personally prefer. Floratam is a thick grass with a thick blade that does well in full sun and it is easy to differentiate because it occasionally has purple leaves and doesn't need as much water as the other types of St. Augustine. Another type, Palmetto grass, does better in the shade than Floratam. Palmetto is cold tolerant and also stays green during the winter. However it is susceptible to getting chinch bugs. I use both types of grass in our yard, one for shaded areas and the other for the sunny easements in the front.

Sodding grass entails digging between two to four inches into the dirt, leveling the ground, planting the sod and watering it thoroughly. Freshly sodded yards during the summer need to be watered daily until established. I suggest walking on the grass while wa-

> tering. At the end of the day you won't be as wet if you use a hand held hose. Though I joke, it is important to walk on the sod daily because it helps the grass take root.

The rainy season is the best time to sod and April is a good month. However, in our temperate zone sodding can be done any time of the year.

Regarding lawn care, remember there are all types of chemicals on the market. I suggest organic, environmentally friendly ones.

What to Plant

During this part of Spring I suggest Gerbera daisies. They are considered annuals but here in South *to Gardening page 9*

Texas, some may live for several years. If you enjoy watching butterflies, then tropical milkweed attracts a variety of butterflies including monarchs. I saw this plant for the first time in the Jefferson Community Garden and it was a spectacular sight. There were hundreds of butterflies surrounding the bush. I understand the bush draws aphids because some butterflies leave larvae on the bush. However the aphids do not migrate to other areas of your garden if you let them be and allow the ecological cycle to continue. The larvae also draw ladybugs and silkworms which eat the aphids. Some things do best when left to Mother Nature. Be careful planting milkweed though if you have dogs, as the seeds and sap are toxic to them. I suggest you plant the milkweed in the front yard.

Jefferson Community Garden

The Jefferson Community Garden is currently in negotiation with Green Spaces Alliance and Thomas Jefferson High School to determine who will be the next steward of the garden. The high school has adopted several beds and holds classes in the garden. The garden is still open to the community, and everyone is welcome to pull weeds or mow. At this time I suggest we wait to start planting until we are informed which beds are available. The garden is a beautiful place that just needs some caring hands to bring it back to its beautiful state. I will continue working on the rose garden, and if you want to help please just pull weeds at this time. I keep pulling but they just keep coming back, like my husband to the dessert table. Please, let's continue working and doing what we can on this worthwhile community project until we hear from Green Spaces Alliance.

Airplane Noise Update

Earlier this year the noise of aircraft over our neighborhood had become so loud and frequent that I'd begun to wonder if all the commercial airlines were gathering for a Normandy style invasion of Oklahoma.

The noise pick-up started almost programmatically, Monday, January 2nd, and the racket from air traffic over our JNA neighborhood continued day and night. I put up with it for a month, then two, but it seemed that the noise was becoming worse and worse. At one point I counted 13 flights overflying our house in about forty minutes. Apparently our house is directly under the most used flight path into San Antonio International airport, and the noise and frequency finally became intolerable.

So, as crack JNA noise pollution czar, I called the San Antonio aviation office to find out why we were being overwhelmed with flight noise. Joshua Heiss of the San Antonio airport called me back. Here's the

scoop:

As of January 2 and until mid-April, the landing strip associated with the flight path that goes over our neighborhood (12R/30L) is taking 100% of the flights coming into and out of San Antonio. The other landing strip (4L/22R) is being repaired. Once repairs are done, the previously disclosed targets of 9% for takeoffs and 7% landings will be in place again.

Mr. Heiss is the San Antonio airport liaison for this information. He's at 210-207-3471, and during our conversation, he asked that his phone number be put out so that anyone in the neighborhood could call him with any comments or questions.

Readers of the JNA newsletter may recall that I did a superb (though sadly not Pulitzer Prize winning) reporting job on the issue a couple years ago. Let me quote some of the deathless prose from that article as it is still useful today:

"The choice of runway is finally the airport controller's and the pilots'... because of prevailing winds, Q1's and Q4's numbers are usually higher than for the rest of the year. The FAA report, *Noise Exposure Map Update and Noise Compatibility Program Revision San Antonio Airport;* December 2014, sets the goal for runway 4's arrival percentage at 9%, and 7% for departures on runway 22.


"Regarding complaints, the airport aviation department answering machine states that voicing a complaint has no impact [I don't think it does that anymore], but letting local officials know if you believe there are excessive fly overs cannot hurt and may help keep our area a little quieter. If you do choose to voice a complaint, your statement will have much more impact if you make accurate counts (ideally with visual confirmation) of date, time and number of planes and state that you are "annoyed" or "very annoyed." "

As I've said before (what a guy!), I believe our neighborhood has good citizens who want to do their fair share in absorbing the discomfort of the noise, but vigilance helps to ensure that we don't get taken advantage of as a neighborhood.

Now, in 2017, there are a couple pieces of good news: first, the end is in sight, with only a few more days when we are in jeopardy of having every single visitor to San Antonio be able to wave hello and goodbye to us from the air. Second, I noticed that one day after my discussion with Mr. Heiss, air traffic directly over my house went down dramatically. In all seriousness, I think this latter result is a testament to the responsiveness of governmentals and quasi-governmentals to citizens who speak up. Imagine what we could do as a unified group on other, more important, issues.


