From CKSII Board Meeting Minutes – September 13, 2016 President, Jennifer Blake called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. The meeting had to be moved to a different site because the school was locked upon arrival. The location of the alternate site was posted on the door to the school for any interested parties to find. Board members Jennifer Blake, Debbie Opperman, Bob Pellegrini, Larry Opperman, Bob Haberkorn, and Robert Sudar were in attendance along with Roger Borcharding of DARCO Property Management.

Treasurer's Report: Debbie reported the HOA currently has 330 members.

2017 Budget Review: Debbie went over the proposed 2017 budget because she will not be able to attend the November meeting. The Board chose to increase the amount budgeted for the newsletter carrier from \$100/ month to \$150/month. Debbie motioned to approve the proposed budget, Robert seconds, and the board approved the proposed budget unanimously.

ACC Committee: Bob Pelligrini reported 14 requests and 14 approved with 0 in pending status. Applications were as follows: 6 for paint, 2 for roofs, 2 for fences, 1 for fence paint, 1 for windows, 1 for garage door, 1 for a shed, and 1 for concrete repair.

Management Report: 3 inspections were conducted in August. 22 violations were processed by mail and by personal contact. Included were 6 campers, 4 boats, 5 trailers, 3 lawns with dry grass, 2 dead trees, and 2 visible trash containers.

Welcome Committee: Jennifer Blake reported that the welcome committee will plan to go out again in November to deliver more welcome boxes.

Landscape Committee: Stephanie Haberkorn reported that they've done weeding and dead-heading and will continue to do that.

Social Committee: Bob Haberkorn reported that he's working to set up a meeting to formally get the Social committee together. They have begun to plan details for the holiday hayride and they have made contact with the horse and trailer owner and they will contact the school to ensure proper parking lot lighting for the event. They are also making other plans should the lights be out again in the parking lot.

Updates: NextDoor site— 43 new neighbors signed up since our last meeting. 229 total neighbors. Jennifer will post to that site about the Holiday Hayride.

New Business: The Board discussed the content of the newsletter and is going to aggregate some ideas about new topics that could be shared in future editions. When Debbie is out of town, Robert will be available if someone needs trash service activated. Debbie will provide the WM contact procedure to him.

The picnic was a great success. 139 folks attended, which was higher than last year. We need a better way to identify picnic participants. There were unpaid people from the park going through the food line. It turned out that we had enough food and drinks, but we may not be so lucky in the future. Different identification possibilities were discussed including a wristband system. The bake sale brought in \$151 for the Leawood Scholarship Fund. The surplus picnic food was donated to the Littleton Fire Station #13 which led the kids parade. Paul will look into different companies that provide bouncy castles for next year's picnic. Richard will do the same for a food provider. Debby will check on the cost of an insert of color pictures from the picnic for The Leawood Rappoter.

Debby said she heard from some people who were confused by two-stage payment process. Chip will take on the task to simplify the payment process for next year's picnic and ensure that the verbiage is clear.

The 2016 Front Yard Parties have been well attended. We will continue them in 2017.

At the picnic, people were inquiring about having a printed neighborhood directory. There is a digital directory online at Leawoodneighbors.com but is only accessible to LCA members. A printed directory will be discussed at the October 5th meeting. A notice of the discussion will be in the Rappoter. Hopefully, residents will attend so that we can get their input.

The Board needs to figure out a way to get residents interested in the LCA so that they will attend the meetings and/or be willing to volunteer their time at events.

From Leawood Metropolitan Recreation and Park District Minutes September 14, 2016 The meeting was called to order at 6:33 PM at Leawood Elementary School's Teacher's Lounge by President Kyle Sargent. Members present were: Directors Linda Smith/VP/Secretary, Donna Snyder/Treasurer, Debby Baker/Special Projects, Jennifer Dawe and Dave Padilla, Parks Manager.

Public Comment/Correspondence – Donna researched the grant applications process for Open Space and Lottery Funds and reported information is to be available the end of this month. Kyle will check the site for further information. Jennifer reported on the infestation of Japanese beetles this year. She requested Dave to check into insecticide to be put on our bluegrass for next year. She also suggested the need for residents to be active in spraying or using granules for their lawns to keep the beetles from developing in the spring.

Treasurer's Report – Donna presented the current Treasurer's Report. Income included property tax and ownership tax. We are close to our projected income on property tax and a bit short so far on projected income from ownership tax. Kyle mentioned the trend for slow automobile sales, especially in August. Lottery reported to Donna that funds should be in the end of the month. Invoices for the month include: Denver Water, Weston Landscaping lawn service maintenance for September, United Site Services, Waste Management, Xcel Energy, DBC for irrigation supplies, Dave's invoice, reimbursement to petty cash, and Rich Alarcon for trash removal. Debby moved the Treasurer's report be received and bills paid. Jennifer seconded and the motion passed.

Parks Manager – Dave received a price from Weston Landscaping for tree trimming in Weaver Park and Raccoon Park. The trimming will take place around the end of October. The process will take about five days in Weaver and two days in Raccoon. Dave met with the resident requesting a replacement tree in Raccoon and let them know we will be planting one in the area requested. We will also replace a dead tree in Weaver Park. KS Electric repaired an electrical outlet at the Weaver Park pavilion that had been damaged. The thistles were removed from the creek area at Weaver by Urban Drainage. Dave noted Urban Drainage will be coming back in the spring to spray the area for new thistles. Irrigation lines were checked and repairs made as needed.

Old Business – 2016-2017 Projects – Kyle presented a spread sheet that will be easier to use as a data base for our projects. Jennifer volunteered to work on it to get it up and running. For the end of the year, we will have Dave focus on tree trimming, grinding some sidewalk areas, get pricing for our other sidewalk projects and getting the benches ordered and set in place.

Is Your Home Secure? by Sheriff Jeff Shrader— Is your home ready to resist crime? Our crime prevention deputies are offering a short quiz on home security that can be taken in just a few minutes. A 'no' answer signifies the areas where you can improve upon your home's security. Home Exterior The way a house's exterior looks, and even how it sounds, can discourage a would-be thief from approaching. Crime prevention experts recommend a well-lit exterior with a bit of stone or gravel at points around the home. Landscaping plants should not be so thick that they can conceal a person approaching. Tree limbs should not provide access to upper floors.

Are your house numbers at least 4 inches tall (preferably 6 inches) and clearly visible from the street both day and night?

Are trees located so they cannot be used to climb to an upper level of the home?

Is there decorative stone or rock that makes noise when someone walks on it near the home?

Do household members routinely secure items of value such as bicycles, lawn mowers, ladders, etc. when not in use?

If there are detached buildings on the property (garage, shed, barn, etc.), are the doors and windows kept locked?

Are vehicles locked and garage door opener remotes removed from them?

Doors & Windows Structurally sound and locked doors and windows are critical components of a secure building. Doors and windows can provide false comfort if they're cheaply made, easily compromised or often kept unlocked.

Are exterior door strike plates secured to the frame of the house with screws at least three inches in length?

Have locking "Charlie" bars been installed in the center of sliding glass doors in lieu of wooden dowels in the bottom track?

Are exterior doors kept locked, even when someone is home?

Are door locks in good repair?

Do occupants of the home avoid hiding keys outside the residence (other than in a lockbox secured to the structure)?

Do basement windows have security bars, grills, or other locking covers?

Garage The garage is all too often an easy entry point for thieves. Many people do not secure their garage doors as well as other exterior doors.

Is the overhead garage door kept closed when not in use?

Is the pedestrian door between the garage and the home kept locked?

Are windows into the garage covered or frosted to prevent visual inspection of valuables from the exterior?

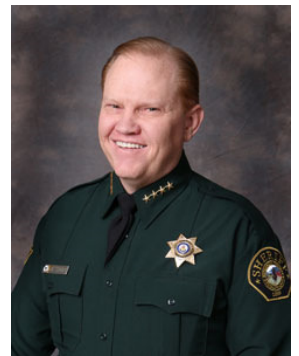
Miscellaneous Recording an inventory of valuables and securing important documents today can prevent future headaches if your home is burglarized.

Have valuable papers (birth certificates, titles, deeds, social security cards, checks, tax records, passports, etc.) been secured in a fire resistant safe or in a safe deposit box?

Do you have an accurate inventory of your valuables that includes make, model, and serial numbers?

Does the home have a safe for storage of firearms and other valuables?

National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week Oct. 23-29, 2016—Jefferson County, Colorado— Public Health professionals recommend all low-income children in Colorado be tested for lead at 12 months and 24 months of age. Colorado's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program identifies approximately 200 children per year with confirmed elevated blood lead levels.

"Lead-Free for a Healthy Future," the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's theme for National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week Oct. 23-29, underscores the importance of testing your home, testing your child and learning to prevent lead poisoning's serious health effects. Following the department's lead screening guidelines will help ensure children at risk can receive treatment. Visit www.colorado.gov/cdphe/leadhealth for more information about blood testing for lead. There is no safe level of lead in the body. Lead is especially dangerous to children because it may affect the normal development of a child's brain. Elevated blood lead levels may result in intelligence quotient (IQ) loss, learning and behavior problems, developmental delays, and lifelong mental and physical health issues.

Lead-based paint was banned for residential use in 1978, and any house built before 1979 might contain some lead-based paint. Approximately 48 percent of the housing units in Colorado were built before 1980. Major sources of lead exposure include not just the lead paint, but lead-contaminated dust from deteriorating building surfaces caused by renovation activities or even normal wear and tear, such as opening and closing windows and doors that were painted with lead-based paint.

Additional sources of lead exposure include contaminated drinking water; take-home exposure from a workplace; soil contaminated by paint chips, auto emissions and other industrial sources; lead in-home remedies; and lead in consumer products and food.

To increase awareness of childhood lead poisoning prevention, the department is sponsoring the following activities during Lead Poisoning Prevention Week 2016:

Paint-can stir sticks with lead awareness messaging, available at hardware stores throughout Colorado, or available by request at cdphe.lead@state.co.us.

3M Leadcheck kits are available to check for lead paint in homes built before 1979. Find information on how to request a kit at <http://www.colorado.gov/cdphe/leadpaint>.

The department is sponsoring a Lead Poisoning Prevention Week Tote Bag Design Contest. Visit www.facebook.com/cdphe.apcd to enter.

Tote bags with lead awareness messaging, including the winning design from the 2015 design contest, will be available throughout Colorado.
