Current Teacher Vacancies

The Arizona School Personnel Administrators Association (ASPAA) is surveying school districts and charter schools to gather the total number of current teacher vacancies throughout Arizona for next year. Of the 51 school districts and charter schools with early responses, there are 1,941 teacher vacancies for next year. Considering there are 230 school districts, 406 charter holders and 13 joint technological education districts in Arizona, the current total teacher vacancies will be considerably greater. Moreover, the majority of the 51 school districts and charter schools indicate that they have 0 to 1 applications per teacher vacancy.

As a reminder, in December 2016, 159 school districts and charter schools had reported 2,166 teacher vacancies four months into the school year with another 2,221 filled by individuals not meeting the standard teacher requirements.

The purpose of sharing these results is to bring awareness to various decision makers as to the need for a collective effort to ensure the recruitment and retention of effective and qualified teachers in Arizona. The large total of current teacher vacancies compared to the small applicant pool continues to be quite troublesome. Arizona needs to make urgent and substantial decisions to address the teacher shortage.



I-17 ALERT: CLOSURES FOR RESURFACING IN PHOENIX CONTINUED

The resurfacing is part of the Arizona Department of Transportation's \$9.8 million I-17 improvement project that started last fall with sidewalk and wheelchair ramp improvements at cross-street interchanges.

Following this first closure, plans call for weekend closures to continue along southbound I-17 before crews begin resurfacing the northbound side of the freeway.

I-17 will be closed one direction at a time for approximately three-mile stretches each weekend while the rubberized asphalt paving takes place.

Drivers should consider alternate routes, including State Route 51 or Loop 101, while I-17 is closed. Travelers can expect heavy backups and delays when I-17 traffic is detoured to the freeway's frontage roads or, in areas without frontage roads, to 19th Avenue.

Other work includes I-17 drainage improvements near Durango Street, new signs and concrete-barrier upgrades ADOT will provide updates on the I-17 resurfacing and scheduled closures on the agency's website and Twitter feed (@ArizonaDOT). Sign up for email alerts by visiting:






