
The Bloomingdale district received its name from the broad fields of flowers planted in the early days by a Mr. Jacob Wuersten, who emigrated from Germany.

Both Bloomingdale and Bowserville were annexed into the City of Fort Wayne in 1871.

In 1861 (I also have a picture that shows 1866), Bloomingdale School began operations at the corner of Second and Marion Streets. In 1887, the development of St. Vincent's Villa, an orphanage, was located on Wells Street.

Most Precious Blood Catholic Church opened its doors in the neighborhood in 1897. Then in 1898 the parish school was added. A new bigger school was built in 1929, which is the current facility.

The Neighborhood Association was formed in Aug 1974. Northwest Central Association was the name chosen, but was changed to **Bloomingdale in 1992**.

They should be used for sitting out on chairs to enjoy the nice weather.


They should not be used to store all of your unsightly items. **No** chair's or sofa's that are meant to be in a living room!!!



Due to the high volume of calls the center receives, it is important that only necessary calls be made on the 911 emergency line so emergency resources can be delivered in an efficient and timely manner.

Franklin School had been vacant for several years. Fort Wayne City wanted to do something with the property. So a committee was formed of people from the city, state, and surrounding neighborhoods.

The majority of the people wanted to see a nice "Quiet Park". Yes, it is close to Hamilton Park, but that park is very land lock, so it was decided that the neighborhood would benefit from a nice splash pad and a pavilion.

So, after many years.....On Wednesday, December 13, 2017, the dedication of phase 2....The Pavilion... will complete the Franklin School Park!

This has been a real community project. Many of the surrounding neighborhoods (Bloomingdale by Bud and Jean Mendenhall) were involved along with the City, Fort Wayne Parks Department, and State Senator Joe Donnelly and State Representative Martin Carbaugh.

Another exciting feature that surprise the Committee is the architecture that was carried from the arches to the Pavilion. See the photo on the right

The first was the demolition day, then the day to start the project. Then the day of the opening of the Splash Pad. Now the most exciting day will be the celebration of the opening of the pavilion!

Jean Hyndman Mendenhall attended Bloomingdale when it was an elementary school. She moved to the home that she is living in now when she started going to the second grade. She graduated 8th in 1952.

So this is exciting for Bloomingdale Neighborhood.
