



CITY OF PHOENIX BOOSTS SALT AND VERDE ALLIANCE

Ensuring Reliable, Clean Water Supplies for Three Million People in the Valley, the Phoenix City Council has approved a three-year partnership with The Nature Conservancy aimed at protecting flows and improving water quality in the Salt and Verde Riv-

Through this partnership, Phoenix will join and invest \$100,000 per year in the Salt and Verde Alliance: Healthy Rivers, Healthy Communities. Phoenix was the first municipality to support the Alliance with a multi-year investment.

The Nature Conservancy, a leading conservation organization working to protect important lands and waters for both people and nature, convened a historic meeting of fourteen rivershed communities in 2016 that led to the creation of the Salt and Verde Alliance. The Alliance serves as a way for communities, corporations and foundations to invest in riverfriendly projects that improve watershed protection, the quantity of flow and the quality of water in the Salt and Verde Rivers.

"A reliable water supply is critical to public health and economic prosperity in Phoenix," said Mayor Thelda Williams. "By protecting and improving our watersheds, the Salt and Verde Alliance Fund aides long-term water security. Phoenix is proud to lead the way as the first municipality to partner with The Nature Conservancy on this fund."

"We appreciate that Phoenix took the lead in helping us create collective action around the protection of the Salt and Verde Rivers," said Pat Graham, State Director, The Nature Conservancy in Arizona. "The extended drought has seen river flows decline by thirty-five percent. The time to act is now. Healthy rivers are essential to a healthy economy as well as countless benefits to people such as clean water and air, food security and beautiful places we enjoy." The Salt and Verde River watersheds encompass 13,000 square miles in the eastern and north central portions of Arizona.

If your child just wants a beverage instead of a full meal he or she can purchase milk or juice for 35 cents or a bottle of water for 50 cents. We are excited about this opportunity and hope you take advantage of it.

The afternoon dismissal bell rings at 3:15 p.m. For safety reasons, we typically do not dismiss students at 3:15 p.m. unless the majority of our buses have arrived. We appreciate your patience the first few weeks of school as we continue to provide a safe environment for your child. CITY OF PHOENIX BOOSTS SALT AND VERDE ALLIANCE continued

These watersheds feed The Salt and Verde Rivers, which are vital surface water supplies to downstream users in the greater Phoenix metropolitan areas. The City of Phoenix obtains more than one half of its raw water supply from these rivers."

Since its inception, the Salt and Verde Alliance has completed several projects, including:

- Thinning 1,600 acres of forests across four project areas within the Kaibab National and Coconino National Forest to reduce wildfire risk in the Verde watershed.
- Increasing water supply by approximately 40,150 acre-feet in the Verde River by implementing projects that benefit local farmers, create water savings, improve water quality and management and reduce future river impacts.

Over the next 3 years, the Alliance aims to thin an additional 12,000 acres of forest and increase water supply through infrastructure improvements.

We kicked off this year with a commitment to our departmental goals outlined in the 2017-2019 Strategic Plan. I'm taking this opportunity to provide a mid-year update on a few key measures, including Crime Suppression and Prevention, Hiring, and Employee Well-Being.

Crime Suppression and Prevention:

Thanks to an enhanced Crime Gun Intelligence Center within the Violent Crimes Bureau, we are solving more gun cases and getting violent offenders off the street. We've identified opportunities to improve communication and resource sharing across our investigative details which has led to a greater ability to connect outstanding cases and more quickly identify repeat offenders. The work ethic of your patrol officers, detectives, and forensic staff has brought up the clearance rate in our Homicide Unit to 62%!

Hiring: Meeting our employee hiring goals remains an ongoing commitment for us.



A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF WILLAIMS CONT...

Maintaining appropriate employee levels for both sworn and civilian staff translates into effective service for our community. We currently manage

2,937 sworn staff and are regularly holding written and physical exams to identify new officers. Last year brought a big win for us with the hiring of 14 new police assistants. The new group has responded to 9,000 calls for service, taken nearly 1,800 reports and handled 570 traffic collisions. I am told almost daily by our officers how much they are appreciated and the impact they are making, especially in addressing our goals for call response times. Our Communications staff has also grown significantly throughout the year due to focused recruiting for operators.

Employee Well-Being: There's no question that careers in law enforcement are challenging. Mental health and wellness is paramount for the safety of both officers and residents. I'm proud to share that we have recently partnered with Crisis Prevention and Recovery (CPR). CPR is a local agency with trained professionals who can provide our officers the support they need. They will also respond to critical incidents to provide on-site assistance during those stressful situations.

We have a lot planned for the remainder of the year. The City Council approved two new measures that will help us as we work to improve safety and increase officer training. We'll embark on a study to identify reasons why we have seen an increase in officer involved shootings. This collaborative study will partner Arizona State University and the National Police Foundation on a project we expect to be completed by the end of this year.

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
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












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




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
