WRONG WAY INNOVATION AWARD FOR ADOT'S I-17 WRONG-WAY VEHICLE SYSTEM

The Arizona Department of Transportation's pilot Interstate 17 wrong way vehicle alert system being tested in Phoenix has been recognized with a Government Innovation Award from GCN, an information technology industry magazine. Governor Doug Ducey, who has directed ADOT to advance efforts to develop wrong-way vehicle countermeasures, including the I-17 system, said the award recognizes the state's commitment to public safety. In addition, Governor Ducey championed a new law that has wrong-way drivers under the influence of drugs or alcohol face felony charges.

The first-in-the-nation system being tested on 15 miles of I-17 uses thermal cameras to detect and track wrong-way vehicles while also immediately alerting ADOT and the Arizona Department of Public Safety. The system also allows ADOT to quickly warn other drivers about wrong-way vehicles via messages on electronic freeway signs, allowing ADOT to evaluate how technology can be used to reduce the risks associated with wrong-way drivers.

Thermal cameras have recorded more than 30 detections of wrong-way vehicles, mostly along I-17 off-ramps located within the project's boundaries. In most incidents, the drivers have turned around on an off-ramp without entering the mainline lanes of I-17. The system's 90 thermal cameras are positioned to detect wrong-way vehicles entering off-ramps or traveling along I-17. The pilot project also is designed to trigger new illuminated wrong-way signs with flashing red lights aimed at getting the attention of the wrong-way driver. This technology cannot prevent all wrong-way crashes from happening. The primary goal is reducing the risk of serious crashes by alerting AZDPS and ADOT to wrong-way vehicles much faster than waiting for 911 calls from other motorists. While technology holds promise for reducing the risk of serious crashes, it can't prevent impaired drivers from getting behind the wheel.

Seven high capacity transit extensions are planned or under construction that will create a 66-mile system by 2034. Valley Metro also offers transit options including alternative transportation programs for seniors and people with disabilities, commuter vanpools, online carpool matching, bus trip mapping, bicycle safety and telework assistance. Two Boards of Directors set the policy direction for the agency with the intent of advancing the regional public transit system. In October 2017, the Boards approved a "Respect the Ride" Code of Conduct, focusing on creating a safe and positive rider experience, while also discouraging disruptive, intrusive, unsafe or inappropriate behaviors in a public setting.
