Phoenix City
Code Chapter 39,
Sec. 39-7D

Property owners are responsible for
keeping their properties, and the
adjacent rights of way, free of dead
or dried vegetation (weeds, tall
grass, tumbleweeds, shrubs, trees,
palm fronds, etc).

**All dead or dried vegetation
must be removed and disposed
of properly. Property owners
are also responsible for assur-**
ing that grass and weeds on
their property and in the adja-
cent rights of way do not ex-
ceed six inches in height.

The Caring Companion Program is for people who are able to come in on a weekly basis to visit with a veteran. Based on the volunteer's interests, they are matched with a veteran. 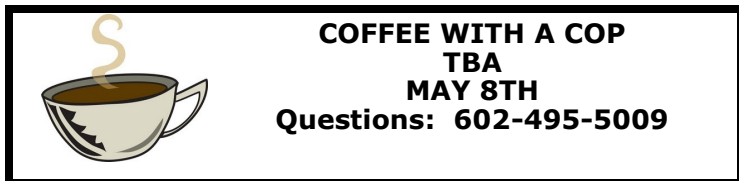

PHOENIX KICKS OFF 2019 STREET PAVING SEASON

Based on the Council-approved \$200 million advancement funded by future street program revenues from Transportation 2050, over the next five years, the City is set to triple the number of arterial and major street miles in its annual pavement maintenance program. The increase in budget for arterial and major streets coupled with the pavement maintenance budget for local and collector streets has created a comprehensive street maintenance program with an annual \$90 million budget to address a backlog of aged and deteriorated streets across Phoenix over the next five years.

In addition to keeping the street network in a state of good repair and extending its lifespan, the City's street maintenance program also enhances the safety of the roadway and supports various mobility improvement efforts to help people get around town with greater ease. In preparation for this year's paving season, the Street Transportation Department repaired damaged sidewalks, curbs and gutters and installed over 2,660 new ADA-compliant wheelchair accessible ramps at intersections throughout the City. As part of the pavement maintenance program, the department is also looking at opportunities to modify roadway configurations to narrow traffic lane widths on some of the City's roadways to promote a street design that is safer and more accommodating for all road users. Approximately 375 street miles are included in this year's pavement maintenance program. During this year's street paving season, the Street Transportation Department is poised to pave approximately 50 miles of the City's most deteriorated arterial and major streets. Some of the arterial and major streets to be paved include:

Bell Road from 35th Avenue to Black Canyon Freeway, Cave Creek Road from Greenway Road to Bell Road, Thunderbird Road from Coral Gables Drive to Cave Creek Road, McDowell Road from 67th Avenue to 59th Avenue. For more info: <https://www.phoenix.gov/streets/PavementProgram>

Our Volunteer program offers a variety of opportunities to spend time with Veterans to show them that they are appreciated. If you can not find one that interests you, please let us know so we can design one especially to meet your needs. You may volunteer in the operations of the home such as being an escort for veterans to hospital appointments or a clerk in our gift shop. We offer 5 areas of volunteer experience:

- **Recreational Therapy activities:** This program include assisting the Rec Therapy team in providing meaningful programs throughout the day. This may include bingo, concerts, socials, cooking, crafts, and movies. This will give you a chance to interact and socialize with the veterans.
- **Special Events:** This program is for individuals and groups who would like to come in for a day to sing, dance or show their appreciation to our Veterans in some other creative manner. This program is ideal for musicians, artists, school or scouting groups.
- **Program Sponsorship:** The Program Sponsorship is great for organizations, a family or a group of friends. This program allows groups to

come in once a month, once a quarter or once a year to provide a special program to the veterans. For example we currently have the Elks and the American Legion who sponsor bingo nights. They bring in all of the volunteers, we provide the supplies and they run the games. We are looking for others to make a commitment to organize poker, pinocle or other games.

- **Caring Companion:** The Caring Companion Program is for people who are able to come in on a weekly basis to visit with a veteran. Volunteers come in and do a variety of activities such as reading them the newspaper, playing a game of cards or taking them next door for a stroll in Steele Indian School park. Our veterans who do not have family members close by are usually placed in this program. This allows the veterans with minimal visitors to have someone in the community become their "adopted" family.
