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Listing your house this spring? Local realtor tells how to get it ready for a faster sale

As the cold weather hopefully is on its way out, the housing market will start to heat back up. After a couple years of an unbelievably strong market, 2019 is already shaping up to be another great year. As we meet with more and more of our clients, a few questions always come up, which can be handy information for anyone looking to sell their home in 2019.

When is a good time to sell? With a market this strong, the time is now. As the saying goes, "Strike while the iron is hot." By listing your home now, you will expose it to a large number of potential buyers and hopefully your home will produce multiple offers. When this happens, it really helps to have a Realtor on your side to navigate each of those offers and weigh the pros and cons of each

offer to make sure that the offer selected will be the best for you.

How do I get my home ready to sell? Now that you've chosen to list your house, it's vital to prepare your home for photos and for the upcoming showings. Coming off a harsh winter, there are quite a few things to look for:

- Dirty carpet from snow and grime tracked in from shoes
- Dirty window screens and glass and window wells. This is an often-overlooked area to clean. When folks tour your home and they look out the doors and windows, they should have a beautiful view of the yard, not a cloudy image through dirty windows.
- Power-washing the siding.
 Again, after all the snow and grime over the winter, many

- times the siding of your home will be extremely dirty. There are many power-washing companies around town that are very reasonable price-wise.
- Paint This is the perfect time to touch up the paint on the exterior of your home. The trim around garage doors and entry doors are often the most damaged areas from a harsh winter.

The last—but perhaps most important—is to DECLUTTER. When potential buyers walk into the home to tour it, they should be able to visualize themselves living there. This becomes much easier when the home is free from clutter. Side tip: this is also a great time to find items to donate, sell or throw away. (Note: Lincoln Village garage sales are May 2-4 this year.)

Turn your clutter into cash with an organized, well-planned garage sale

Editor's note: With the Lincoln Village spring garage sales coming up May 2-4, it's the perfect time to start getting ready to have a successful sale.

With some careful planning, you can declutter your home and get some extra cash. The first step is to go through your things and decide what to sell, keep or donate.

Conquer your clutter

One method that works well is to put yard sale items aside all year long. Designate some boxes or shelves in a closet or attic, and discard any unwanted clothing and household things there. When you've collected enough, it's sale time.

If you're sorting through your clutter for the first time, break the job down into small, manageable tasks.

"It's not realistic to think you can tackle 20 years of clutter in one day," says Barry Izsak, CPO®, certified professional organizer and author of *Organize Your Garage in No Time*.

Follow these tips to make sorting less painful:

- Easy does it. Make the unemotional decisions first. Start with things you can easily let go of, like 10 years' worth of magazines you've saved.
- Start small. Begin with one drawer or cabinet at a time, then move on to the next. When you've finished an entire room, begin the same process in another. "This is the perfect time to ask yourself, 'What can I let go of? What can I live without?" says Izsak.

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Keep it clean

Once you've decided which items to sell, it's time to break out the dust cloths and wipes, and give everything a thorough cleaning. People may shop yard sales for bargains, but that doesn't mean they want to sort through someone else's dirty, dusty toys and glassware.

The price Is right

Decide how you'll price things beforehand, and use color-coded stickers to make it easier to keep track of different-priced items.

Be realistic about what people will pay at a yard sale. "If you paid \$80 for something, start out selling it for \$40," says Izsak. "The primary goal is to get rid of it."

Think like a merchandiser

Make a great first impression with a sale that's well laid out and attractive. "People will value your things a little more if they see you're putting your time and effort into your sale," says Jennifer Jones of I Heart Organizing. Big-ticket items, like furniture or baby strollers, should be front and center where drivers can easily see them.

Put something equally eye-catching at the back of the sale like a large painting, mirrors or a floor lamp. It doesn't have to be your best item, "but something interesting that people will be willing to wander through your whole sale to see," says Betsy Pruitt of Belly Feathers.

Nobody wants to stop at a sale that looks picked over, so keep reviewing things throughout the day. As items

sell, close any large gaps by moving things closer to the street, so it appears you're still well-stocked with potential treasures.

Try these other display tips to make your sale a success:

• It's all in the details. Thoughtful touches can help your sale stand out. Try wrapping sets of baby linens or fabric with twine or ribbon, says Jones. Pruitt suggests displaying jewelry on custom card stock that matches your sale signage. "It makes items seem much more special and interesting, and they sell more quickly," she says.

- Tables everywhere. Don't make people bend down to look at your things. Use regular tables for most items and low tables for kids' items.
- **Hang them up**. Hang your clothes on a portable rack to add a boutique feel to your sale.
- Display in groups. Do you have several lamps, purses or picture frames to sell? Group them all together in one place so buyers can easily see what you have.

Make it fun

Create an inviting feel right from the start with colorful balloons on your mailbox. Set your iPod to shuffle, and provide some background music while people shop. To keep people shopping, set up a table and offer refreshments and small snacks.



Everything must go

- Free for all. Have a box or two of free items at your sale filled with things you would typically donate anyway. "People like that because they don't expect to go to a sale and walk away with anything for free," says Jones. "And it's one less thing for you to take to Goodwill."
- Super sale. Decide in advance that by a certain time, any items you have left will be 50 percent off. During the last hour, offer everything for free.
 "People took things that they might not have bought otherwise, which made our job easier at the end of the day," says Pruitt.



On January 25, a Lincoln Village homeowner reported seeing a coyote in her back yard on the Nextdoor Lincoln Village website. Other neighbors quickly chimed in, concerned about their dogs' safety.

While there haven't been many sightings in Lincoln Village, coyotes are glimpsed occasionally—more often in winter, near dusk and dawn. For information about coyotes, we went to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

Coyotes are common in Indiana

"Coyotes thrive near people because they like to eat the rodents and rabbits that thrive near people," explains Geriann Albers, a DNR furbearer biologist. "Seeing them in urban areas happens pretty regularly and is not unusual."

Most young coyotes leave their parents to start looking for new homes during winter. In addition, coyote breeding season starts in January, and coyotes may be more mobile during that time as well.

For the most part, they're not interested in your pets

Here's what we learned: Coyotes eat squirrels, rats, mice, rabbits and other small animals. They are not picky, however, and will attack pets occasionally. They are opportunistic predators—if they find a small enough dog or cat, they'll take it.

Coyote prevention techniques

- Feed pets indoors when possible; pick up leftovers if feeding outdoors; and store pet and livestock feed where it's inaccessible to wildlife.
- Eliminate water bowls and other water sources (if possible).
- Position bird feeders in a location that is less likely to attract small animals or bring the feeders in at night (to keep coyotes from feeding on the bird food or the other animals). Take down bird feeders if issues are occurring.
- Do not discard edible garbage where coyotes can get to it. Secure garbage containers.
- Always keep pets leashed when outside (as stipulated by Fort Wayne's city code). Also note that in Lincoln Village, pets are not allowed to be housed outside.

How to scare a coyote off

If you see coyotes around your home, discourage them by shouting, making loud noises, shaking a container of coins, using an air horn or whistle, spraying them with a hose, or throwing rocks or tennis balls but NEVER corner a coyote – always give the coyote a free escape route.
