Storage of residents recreational vehicles continues to be an ongoing issue in Columbine West. CWCA acknowledges and thanks those residents who comply with the covenants, which specify that all recreational vehicles must be hidden from view, either in your garage or behind a 6' wooden fence. On the flip side, recreational vehicles parked in driveways and on the street can create problems. Some residents have reported trouble seeing around large recreational vehicles when trying to back out of their driveways. Our neighborhood children who may be on the sidewalk are at greater risk of not being seen, due to

sight lines being blocked by large recreational vehicles. Along with the safety fac-

tor, parking large recreational vehicles on the street takes up valuable parking space

for others, especially those that live in cul-de-sacs. While CWCA covenants state - a

recreational vehicle shall not be permitted to remain upon any lot or public 'right of

way' either temporarily or permanently unless hidden from view, homeowners are

"Questions? Questions?"

A note was written into CWCA. Several of us good neighbors would like to see you address this subject in the CWCA newsletter... "What is the correct way to dispose of yard waste? Is it correct to "blow" or "rake" it into the streets & leave it for the Leaf Fairy?"

If the cut grass is too long for mulching, it can be broomed into a big pile and then put into a trash bag. Whatever is left over try to blow or broom it back into the yard. Try to keep grass out of the street as it looks very tacky just blown out into the road and left to raom the neighborhood once the wind blows. Blowing grass and/ or leaves into the street can clog catch basins which then prevent storm water from properly draining off the streets. Flooded corners can be traffic hazards and excessive storm water can find its way into basements and crawlspaces of your house or your neighbors. Yard trimmings, grass clippings, and leaves blown or swept into the street can reach the storm drain and can damage aquatic environments by adding too much vegetation to the water. When too many decomposing plants or lawn clippings end up in a waterbody, they take oxygen out of the water, suffocating other aquatic life like fish and frogs. Gray water that travels into our reservours is a very precious commodity and we should be good neighbors by protecting those resources.

CWCA Elections in May

Elections will be held during the May 13th CWCA Board meeting. The positions of Pres., V.P., Treasurer & Secretary are one year tenure and are part of the annual election process. Those individuals looking toward Pres. & V.P. must have held a Board position to be considered for election. CWCA has (6) positions for Board Members, with three positions having alternating year elections. This year there are (2) Board positions that are coming up for election and one open position. These positions ask for a volunteer to make a (2) year commitment, attend monthly meetings and require that Board members reside in the neighborhood and be current paid members. Board members also have an opportunity to attend Co-Hope meetings on a rotational schedule. At anytime community members who would like to volunteer on a project can attend a monthly meeting, which is open to all neighbors, or leave a message on the voice mail line.

Event is open to Columbine West residents only. Participants must have a picture ID with valid Columbine West address or proof of address from a current Xcel bill.

Food donations of canned goods and non-perishables will benefit the Open Arms Food Bank which serves the Columbine area, so be as generous as possible.

Recycling areas in the order they will be set up are:

- Document Shredding All your important personal documents shredded on-site as you watch if you request.
- Metal Recycling metal, aluminum, copper, cords/strings
 of lights, automobile batteries, lawn mowers, appliances
 such as refrigerators, dishwashers, washers/dryers, stoves,
 and microwaves, as well as barbeques, are all accepted
 items, and help pay for this event. Make sure gas and oil
 have been drained from lawn mowers and power tools
 prior to recycling.
- Electronic Recycling TV's, computer monitors, laptops, and hard drives, cell phones, and other electronics will be recycled in an environmentally green way.
- Trash anything you would normally take to the dump such as bushes, tree limbs, fencing, furniture, scrap lumber, and mattresses can be dropped off.

No hazardous waste materials will be accepted. This includes paint, chemical products, gas and oil, and propane containers. Clean out your garages, basements and backyards, and get rid of stuff you no longer need or want. Save money and de-clutter in the process. You can make as many trips as necessary within the 4-hour event. Volunteers will be on hand to help you unload. Columbine Kiwanis Support Alive at 25

John Anderson, Director, Colorado State Patrol Family Foundation, was our guest speaker on April 2, 2014. Kiwanis President Carl Mulay is shown in the adjacent photo presenting him with a donation from the club of \$1,400.78 for the "Alive at 25" Program. "Alive at 25" is an attitudinal drivers safety course aimed at youth between the ages of 16 and 25. The Columbine Kiwanis club is proud to support this very successful program in reducing automobile fatalities of our youth.

WHY DO WE NEED ALIVE AT 25?

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of teen fatalities, accounting for 44% of teen deaths in the U.S.

- Young drivers are involved in fatal crashes at more than twice the rate of all others
- The first year for a newly licensed teenage driver is the most dangerous, with more than one in five involved in crashes
- Each year nearly 6,000 teens are killed in vehicular accidents; more than 3,800 are drivers aged 15-20
- Annually, more than 326,000 young drivers are seriously injured
- 116 young drivers were killed in Colorado in 2007; 86 (74%) were not wearing safety belts; 56 of these were ejected from the vehicle
- More than half the deaths occurred between Friday and Sunday; 41% occurred between 9:00pm and 6:00am
- Exceeding the posted speed limit or driving at an unsafe speed is the most common error in fatal teenage accidents

- More than 1,000 young drivers lose their lives each year in crashes because of an impaired driver, be it themselves or someone else
- Although this group represents about 7% of the nations' licensed drivers, they are involved in nearly 15% of all fatal crashes

NATIONAL LEMONADE DAYS RECIPE FROM CHEF ALEX GUARNASCHELLI LEMON LIME LEMONADE

Serves 6-8

"I like that this lemonade is slightly bubbly from the addition of the lemon lime soda. I also make it with seltzer."

- Alex Guarnaschelli

- 1 cup (8 ounces) fresh lemon juice
- 1/2 cup (4 ounces) fresh lime juice
- 1/2 cup (4 ounces) honey
- 1/4 scant teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper
- 1 lemon, sliced into 1/2-inch thick rounds
- 1 lime, sliced into 1/2-inch thick rounds
- 1 cup (8 ounces) chilled lemon-lime soda
- 1. In a large container with a fitted lid, combine the lemon juice, lime juice, honey. Cover and shake it to blend.

Refrigerate for at least one hour. Taste. 2. Fill a pitcher with ice cubes and the slices of lemon and lime. Using a long wooden spoon, stir to blend while pouring in the lemon lime soda. Stir, reaching down into the bottom of the pitcher with the spoon, until all of the ingredients are blended.

Serve immediately.

Note: If making larger batches, make some ice cubes from the lemonade mix. That way the lemonade ice cubes won't dilute the flavor of the lemonade.



Respect Blue Spaces

In an effort to discourage illegal parking and seek voluntary compliance, the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office is issuing warnings to violators who fail to display appropriate disability placards.

On March 11, 2014, the Jefferson County Board of County Commissioner's adopted a revision increasing the fines associated with parking privileges for persons with disabilities (42-4-1208). The traffic infraction for unauthorized parking in a designated disabled parking spot will now result in a fine of \$350 for the first offense, and \$600 for subsequent offenses. The ordinance took effect on April 11, 2014.

The State of Colorado issues license plates and placards to qualified persons with disabilities to park in reserved parking spaces. Disability parking is provided to assure that individuals requiring additional space to enter or exit their vehicles have the needed space and accommodates closer parking to a main entrance. The disability parking privilege allows a qualified individual to park in any space marked with the International Symbol of Access (blue spaces).

The State of Colorado offers identifying license plates and placards for persons with disabilities to park in reserved parking spaces. A person with a disability may apply for:

- An identifying placard to be prominently displayed on a motor vehicle used to transport such person with a disability.
- A distinguishing license plate to be displayed on a motor vehicle owned by such person.

If the person with a disability is also a Disabled Veteran as determined by 42-3-213(5), C.R.S., that person may elect to display the Handicap Disabled Veteran license plates.

Identifying license plates or placards can be issued to a person by submitting a completed DR 2219 Persons with Disabilities Parking Privileges Application to the County Motor Vehicle Office. The application must be signed by the applicant or a representative.

Replacement Placards

If the placard has been lost, stolen, mutilated, or otherwise damaged and the replacement placard is being requested prior to the expiration date, the damaged or mutilated placards should be surrendered to the Authorized Agent for replacement. You must provide a copy of the DR 2574 registration receipt for the placard being replaced as proof for replacement validation.

The wedding season is coming, so be prepared: The average cost of a wedding is now \$28,427. The economy isn't much of a factor: A survey from wedding consultants The Knot found that only 26 percent of brides in 2013 said the economic picture affected how much they spent on their big day, a figure down from 29 percent in 2011 and 34 percent in 2009.

Lace is still a popular choice for wedding gowns, along with textured fabrics featuring layers, tiers, and three-dimensional appliqués. As for designs, dramatic backs with deep plunges are a hot trend. Bridesmaids' dresses are likely to be shades of pink, yellow, gray, and purple in 2014.

Going To College Online Is Growing

Going to a classroom to learn is so 20th century. Online learning is the hot new thing, according to a study by the Sloan Consortium. In the fall of 2012, for example, more than 7.1 million college students took at least one online course, an increase of about 411,000 over the previous year. These days, almost 33 percent of college students are taking at least one online course. Between fall 2002 and fall 2012, the number of students enrolled in online classes rose 6.1 percent, while the number enrolled in standard, in-person college courses climbed only 2.5 percent.

Professors and administrators seem to support the trend. The study found that over 74 percent of academic leaders consider online courses equivalent to, or even better than, traditional teaching, and 66 percent say that virtual classes leading to college degrees are essential elements in their schools' long-term strategy.
