Trimming Vegetation Away From Sidewalks, Street Signs & Lightpoles We Are Good Neighbors

As fall sets in it is time to take a look around our property and see if any peripheral landscaping needs to be trimmed back and cleaned up. Sometimes a small bush seems to explode with growth over the summer season and now it has encroached onto the sidewalk. Maybe your front or side yard tree has begun to stretch over the sidewalk and is now hanging a bit too low for walkers to travel underneath. If you have a fruit tree that has decided to drop it's fruit and it is landing on the sidewalk, it could be time to trim it back also. Some corner lots may have street signs that have become covered by foliage, please trim it away to allow for proper vehicle travel. Also, please keep in mind that corner lots need to have a visual site line to allow for traffic flow. This means that landscaping should not be any higher than 36" on a corner. A few areas in Columbine West have seen trees that are growing up and around street lights. In the Winter time it is not usually noticed, but during the summer when the trees have leafed out, lighting of the streets can be compromised. For the safety of all neighbors we should try to keep the lights clear of branches. It was mentioned in the newsletter earlier in the summer about keeping extra organic matter out of the gutters and potentially entering the sewer drains. As the leaves begin to fall, please try to collect them before they end up in the streets and gutters. Leaves make great compost material, mulch for flower beds and stuffing for front yard Halloween scarecrows. Keeping the gutters clear can also aid with rain and snow run-off and help to fend off ice build-ups. Neighbors new to the community usually comment first on how nice it is to have mature trees and landscaping, followed by questions concerning why a homeowner has not cut down a dead or dying tree. If the tree has no more life left to it and is possessing a concern of falling down and damaging property, maybe it is time to call in the professionals. Homeownership has its privileges and its expenses. Thank you for taking the time to keep everyone safe within Columbine West. The association strives to

Foothills Park & Recreation District on the November 2014 Ballot

Foothills Park & Recreation District will be placing a question on the November 2014 ballot that would ask voters for an increase in the mill levy rate. The District would use this additional revenue to:

- Fund critically needed capital repairs and capital equipment for existing parks and facilities.
- Offset increasing operational costs for current programs, parks and facilities.
- Improve park maintenance and athletic field conditions.
- Leverage private, local, state and federal grant funds that require a funding match.

Mill Levy election failures in 2006 and 2008 have resulted in the District implementing efficiencies to continue to provide services to the community. The mill levy rate for operations has only increased twice in the last 32 years: in 2000 and 1982. Many Foothills parks and a few facilities are more than 30 years old and in need of significant repair. Funds will only be used to update and enhance existing facilities, parks and trails. In many cases, the proposed capital repairs can result in operational savings through more efficient systems, allowing for less need of repairs for an aging infrastructure.

• If a 4 mill increase question is approved by District voters, the new tax would be applied to property taxes starting in 2015, and would generate approximately \$3.7 million annually.

• A voter approved mill levy increase would result in additional property taxes of about \$2.65 per month per \$100,000 of a home's actual market value.

Covenant Corner News

We will be highlighting individual covenants in the next several issues of the newsletter. Where appropriate, we will also add related zoning information pertinent to the covenant topic. Covenants are created by the developers who build a neighborhood based on specifications identified in the Official Development Plan (ODP) for that specific area. Zoning regulations are established by the county and are specific to how an area is designated, such as residential, agricultural, commercial, etc. Columbine West is designated Residential R-1. Whenever there is a conflict between the covenant restrictions and zoning regulations, covenants always take precedence over zoning. Since election season is underway, we will start with Signs.

Covenant C-7 Signs (Covenant B-9 for those in the Columbine West Hillside Addition):

"No sign of any kind shall be displayed to the public view on any lot except one professional sign of not more than one square foot, one sign of not more than five square feet advertising the property for sale or rent, or signs used by a builder to advertise the property during the construction and sales period."

Zoning: Section 11 Signs and Outdoor Advertising Devices

- B: General
 - 1. Regulation
 - b. No sign shall be placed in the right-of-way of any public street/road or highway except as specifically provided for in parts of this section of this Zoning Resolution.
- D: Signs or Advertising Devices Not Requiring Permits:
 - 8. Political Signs: Signs which do not exceed 6 square feet in area that announce the candidacy for election to various governmental offices or state a position concerning political issues. These signs shall not be placed in public rights-of-way, on public utility poles, or placed on private property without permission of the landowner, shall not be illuminated, and shall be removed within 10 days after the day of election to which they pertain.
- F: Specific Zone District Sign Regulations
 - 2. Residential Zone District R-1
 - a. maximum number of signs per lot: One single or double-faced sign.

Section D-8 above also applies to garage sale and lost pet signs.

Tips on Tipping: How Much To Reward Service Staff?

Waiters and other service staff members depend on tips, so how are they doing? A Harris Poll survey of 2,000 adults conducted for Michelin found that the average American claims to tip 18 percent for good service. Getting more specific, 70 percent of Americans say they usually leave a tip of 15-20 percent when service is good, and about one in 10 tip 20 percent or more. Only about 1 percent confess to leaving nothing. Age is a factor in how much people tip, though: Thirty percent of survey participants age 18-24 admit they frequently tip less than 15 percent even when the service is good, but only 16% of adults over 35 say the same.

Behind the Badge: Elder Abuse

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office is taking a systemic approach to one of the fastest growing crimes in the county. Until recently, elder abuse has been slow to gain attention, causing elder abuse to be under-reported and under-investigated. Recognizing that over 20% of Jefferson County's population is over 60-years of age (and projected to be 27% by 2020), the Sheriff's Office began partnering with the Jefferson County's District Attorney's Office to address the growing trend. The DA's office created an Elder Abuse Prosecution Unit, the only one of its kind in the state of Colorado, which is leading the charge in elder abuse prosecution. The elder abuse cause is also gaining momentum thanks to new legislation, effective July 1, 2014, making it mandatory to report elder abuse. The law (C.R.S. 18-6.5-108) stipulates that medical professionals, social workers, care facilities, guardians, financial institutions and emergency services providers shall report abuse or exploitation to law enforcement within 24 hours. The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office recognizes the time sensitivity of these cases and considers elder abuse cases a high priority. The DA's Office subsequently assigns an investigator to review the report. The new law will allow Jeffco to better identify and prevent elder abuse, prosecute offenders, and assist elder abuse victims. The legislature also recognizes the need for swift action in investigating and prosecuting these cases.

What is Elder Abuse?

Elder abuse can be any type of crime perpetrated against an at-risk adult*. This can include physical abuse, financial exploitation, caretaker neglect, neglect and sexual abuse.

1. Warning signs of elder abuse

The Sheriff believes that law enforcement, prosecutors and the community can do a better job in protecting the elderly against crimes and abuse, but we need your help. Do you recognize any of the below warning signs?

Physical Abuse: unexplained bruising, scratches, burns, broken bones or other injuries.

Neglect: changes in personal grooming, weight loss, unkempt appearance, unsanitary living conditions, dirty and un-bathed.

Caretaker Neglect: when adequate food, clothing, shelter, psychological care, physical care, medical care, or supervision is not secured for an at-risk adult in a timely manner.

Exploitation: large withdrawals from, or depletion of bank accounts, changes in designation of beneficiaries to wills or other financial documents, actions exceeding the scope of a power of attorney, new friends or relatives appearing in the elder's life, unnecessary purchases or expenditures.

Sexual Abuse: bruising around genitalia, venereal disease or unexplained infections, torn, stained or bloody clothing.

Emotional Abuse: overbearing or threatening caregiver, changes in mood or behavior.

2. How to Report

Individuals identified as mandatory reporters who fail to report elder abuse could face a class 3 misdemeanor with a penalty of up to 6 months jail and/or \$750 fine. To report elder abuse occurring in Jefferson County please call: 303-277-0211. As always, in case of an emergency please dial 911.

*At-risk adult includes anyone 60-years or older for crimes committed before 5/16/13, and 70 years or older after 5/16/13.



Nature's Dangers - Ourselves

When it comes to nature, dangers are out there, but not always the way you might think. Dangers can be in animals or weather, but most dangers and fears are in us. They lurk in our decision making and perceptions but rarely are dangers sneaking around behind bushes waiting to pounce on us. Hypothermia, heat exhaustion, dehydration, falls, sunburns, insect bites and skin injuries from plants are very common and often preventable. Being prepared for emergencies and having basic outdoor gear can help avoid deadly or harmful conditions, and allows us to relax in nature.

Animal encounters resulting in human harm are relatively rare considering the sheer numbers of animals and humans that pass into their realms. Even animals with teeth and claws, such as bears and mountain lions, often get a bad reputation when the reality is that fewer than 25 people have been killed by mountain lions since the late 1800's. Despite having nearly a million black bears in North America, there's less than one fatality per year. The most dangerous animal in the world is the mosquito and it's responsible for more human fatalities and harm than all other animals - hardly a creature with teeth and claws or scales and venom. Aside from the low probability of attacks in general, some animals use a warning system, and those systems are very obvious if we look or hear for them. It is important to remember that animals that invoke fear in us would really rather not encounter us. Animals are everywhere, and they see us far more often than we see them. To them we present a threat, we are gigantic in many cases, and we're predators. Unless they truly feel threatened and without choice, most would rather simply walk, fly, slither or run away than harm us. True fear is often driving them when attacks happen, but it doesn't have to drive

The computer gaming industry is commonly seen as a boy's only club, but that may be slowly changing. The International Game Developers Association's recent study of the gaming workplace found that 22 percent of today's game developers are female, up from 11.5 percent in 2009.

- **Salaries.** Almost half of game developers (47 percent) earn less than \$50,000 a year; 34 percent make between \$50,000 and \$100,000, and 19 percent earn more than \$100,000.
- **Motivation.** They're split between love and money: Forty-one percent work in the industry solely for the money, and 40 percent are following their passion.

Trick or Treat! Plan For a Safe Halloween

- Choose costumes in light or bright colors. Whether you buy a costume or make one, be sure it will be visible after dark. Put some reflective tape on goodie bags to help them show up on the street.
- Eat before going out. Serve dinner or a good healthy snack before your kids hit the neighborhood. They'll be less likely to gorge on the candy they collect if they're already full.
